INTREL 697 IR Special Topics, Gender, Health & Sexuality with Courtenay Sprague Gender, health and sexuality are key constructs that intersect to affect the security, wellbeing and capabilities of individuals and societies. Gender is a term used to describe characteristics of women and men that are socially constructed, learned and performed. Gender refers to social relationships in terms of roles, activities, attributes, behaviors and opportunities, based on differential levels of power. The purpose of this course is to analyze the construction, practice and implications of the gender, health and sexuality intersection today, using multi-disciplinary approaches. At the center of our inquiry is the social construction and shaping of gender and sexuality through norms, expectations, behaviors and social systems, including systems of marginalization and exploitation that generate inequity and injustice. We will employ different theories, frameworks and literatures to consider these intersections, and the increasing, negative effects for selected groups and populations, including: insecurity, inequity, risk of disease, bias, stigma, discrimination, and poor physical and mental health outcomes. Building on linkages with human security and human development, we will identify novel approaches and innovations to inform global and national gender, health and sexuality research and policy agendas that advance social justice and health equity.

ConRes 690: Mediation /Court Internship is 6-credit course which is open to any matriculated ConRes student who has completed ConRes 621: Negotiation. It involves both a regular class meeting on a pre-set number of Saturdays and spending one half-day per week in court, with an on-site supervisor/coach, for 4 full months. There is also a required 2-day pre-court training workshop. Enrollment is limited to 10 students. If more than 10 students request permission to enroll we will hold a lottery to determine who is able to enroll this term. Those students not chosen will be given priority placement for next semester.

Students are placed in District Courts in Quincy and Dorchester. All of the courts are accessible by public transportation.

ODR has been growing steadily over the past twenty years, driven mainly by the expansion of eCommerce, but the pandemic has accelerated this growth markedly as face-to-face options for dispute resolution have evaporated. In this course, you'll be introduced to ODR, learn about the latest developments in the field, and view ODR technology in action. This class will also address some of the complex challenges raised by the growth of ODR, including ethical and practice dilemmas, as well as outlining emerging best practices and procedural safeguards.
